



Moon Records have released a Bimskalabim 12" ep, and a new lot - The Moon Records 6 pack. Starting the ball rolling are the Toasters/Beat Brigade with 'Talk Is Cheap'/'Try And Try Again'. The second is from Legal Gender/The Scene with 'Overcast'/'Bruise In Me'. The Toasters 'Ska Boom' LP should also be out stateside shortly,

The 7" due to be released by Roddy is now a 12" ep which should be available soon (see reviews) and a mini-album is being worked on, Bimskalabim's 'Boston Blue Beat' should be available by the time you read this.

In the pipeline for Ska Records are vols 263 of Skaville USA. The first will be Boston bands and the next will be more NYC bands, sounds good. Roddy's keeping himself busy these days, being worked on are LPs from The Roilers and Second Step. Good luck with them matey! "Listen to The Boilers' version of 'Chubby' and you'll be sold on 'em" said our Rodders. how right he was.

Sham 'Beasty Boys' 69 have a new single out which has had a lot of playing on Radio 1 (how disgusting!). Let's just say it's Def man.

Riki's shop 'Zoot Scootz' is doing well. Apart from his spairs repairs etc. He's also dealing in T shirts and records. So far he's got records from Inferno to punt, but hopefully he'll soon be dealing in Trojan as well. T shirt wise- He's waiting for 'Tighten Up' shirts coming in to flog along with his Hi Style etc. Get in touch with him at Unit 12, 265 Abercromby Street, Bridgeton, Glasgow.

SWEET SOUL MUSIC

The story of Stax Records and Its preatest star: Otis Redding.

Satellite Records was started in 1959 by Jim Stewart and his sister Estelle Axton. Before that they had run a record shop called Satellite, so it was only natural that they should move on and start their own label. Their first releases were of the Country and Western idiom. But since their shop was in the heart of a mainly black populated district, there was a great demand for R&B. Therefor R&B was soon to be the main music of Satellite records.

Rufus Thomas (who was, at that time, a local radio DJ) along with his daughter Carla soon gave Satellite their first hit with 'Let me be good to you'. And in 1960 Carla had her first solo hit with 'Gee whiz' which sold a million copies.

In 1961 the name was changed to Stax, taking the "ST" from Stewart and the "AX" from Axton. They purchased the disused Capitol Cinema on East McLemore Avenue and laid it out as a studio and office complex.

Until the late '60s Stax Records were distributed through Atlantic. And from time to time Stax acts appeared on Atlantic and Atco, as well as Stax's subsiduary labels The most well known of them were Volt and Enterprise. Also, a lot of Atlantic's stars recorded for Stax, including Wilson Picket and Don Covay. The Stax sound was a sound of their own, clean, spare, usually only lightly produced. It was based on a relaxed rythm section backed up by a punchy horn section, and was therefor instantly recognisable.

The resident session band was Booker T& the MCs, plus the Mar-Keys horn section, and eventually the Bar-Kays became second studio outfit. The company enjoyed great success with such people as Otis Redding, Sam and Dave, Rufus Thomas, Carla Thomas, Eddie Floyd, William Bell, and Johnnie Taylor. They also recorded a lot of 'second division' artists who were responsible for some great records, including many million sellers. Isaac Hayes and David Porter were originally brought in as writers

/producers. but both launched solo careers and Isaac giant of black music while still with Stax. Stax showed the world that soul music could sell in vast quantities to a cross over audience, but still remain true to its ethnic roots. The Star sound was very popular, but was more than just plain pop and never comprised itself to either the rock or showbiz formula. which others like Motown sometimes flirted with.

In the late '60s Star was bought over by the Paramount entertainment arm of the vast Gulf and Western industrial conglomerate. To mark the event a massive 2 week recording binge got under way, with Booker T & the MCs/the Mar-Keys doing one 12 hour shift and the Bar-Kays the other as the company's stars all did their bit.

Jim Stewart had been kept on to head the company and in 1972 he bought the company back, but soon ran into financial trouble . To try and see him through he moved into a wider range of music including rock, gospel, blues, jazz and country. But even this didn't help. To make matters worse people started pirating a lot of Stax material (hundreds of thousands of counterfeit Isaac Haves albums flooded the market).

It has been said that without the help of A&R man Al Bell Stax would probably never have happenned. Stewart had very little knowlege of music and which records would be hits. For example, he didn't want to release 'Last night' by the Mar-Keys as he didn't think it was good enough. It was released instead by Atlantic and became a million seller.

In 1975 the company was put into liquidation by its bankers. The artists went their seperate ways, the McLemore Ave studios became an empty shell and the master tapes were bought by Fantasy. who have re-released a lot of material in ensuing years. It is interesting to note that few of the original Stax artists have managed to achieve any significant success since.

* * * * * * * OTIS REDDING * * * * * * * * * *

Otis Redding's untimely death in 1967 brought to an end 7 years of the best soul music the world has known.

Otis was born in 1943 in Dawson, Georgia. He started singing, like so many other soul singers, in the local church choir and at

school, and was soon singing at gigs around his home town. A school friend, Phil Walden (later to become boss of Capricorn records), introduced Otis to a local band Johnny Jenkins and the Pinetoppers. And in 1959 he went on tour with them as a general assistant and occasional singer. During the following few years he recorded for a number of small record companies but didn't achieve much success. But in 1962 he got his first real break, almost by accident, Johnny Jenkins was recording a record for Stax and had time left over at the end. So Otis was given the chance to record a couple of his own compositions. Jim Stewart was so impressed by his singing that he signed Otis on the spot. 'These arms of mine' was released in November '62, It made an impression in the American charts and paved the way for his second single release 'Pain in my heart'. In 1963 Otis released his first LP, also called 'Pain in my heart', which included

covers of R&B hits and some of his self composed numbers like 'Security' and 'That's what my heart needs'. Over the next four years Otis released some of his greatest work

Singles included 'That's how strong my love is'. 'I've been loving you too long'. 'Respect' (later to be covered by the queen of soul Aretha Franklin), 'I can't turn you loose, the Rolling Stones' 'Satisfaction' and Fa Fa Fa Fa Fa (sad some) Each single did considerably well and helped establish Otis as a major star.

The albums released during these years were of equal high quality. 'The Great Otis Redding sings soul ballads' includes some excellent material like Jackie Wilsons "A woman, a lover, a friend' and Jerry Butler's 'For your precious love', Another LP 'Otis blue' is said to be his best work and includes 'I've been lowing you too long' and 'My girl' as well as excellent covers of Sam Cooke's 'Shake'. Solomon Burke's 'Down in my valley' and EB King's

At last the LP the whole world has been waiting for, the debut LP from Potato 5, and with the added attraction of Laurel Aitken thrown in. And what a debut. It features all the favourite Potato 5 numbers, and on the B side Laurel gives his all. Although I personnaly never thought that Laurel's voice would go well with the Spuds brand of ska, I have now been proved horribly wrong. Sally Brown is just about the best ska song I have heard in a long time, and Mad About You has a nice bluesy sound to it, All in all a very good LP and well worth the asking price.

RECRIMINATIONSTHE TOASTERS (MOON RECORDS)

An old 12° offering from America's finest ska band. The songs on this particular one are 'Run Rudy Run', 'Razor Cut', 'Radiation Skank' and the excellent 'Recriminations', All recorded way back in '85 but still available and well worth buying, 'Cos it really is rather spiffing! It's now available over here on Unicorn, do you have absolutely no excuse for not having it in your collection.

SKA-VILLE USA..... VARIOUS (SKA RECORDS)

Believe it or not the first time I did this review it was actually a preview! So it just shows how long I've been away. Now I think EVERYONE has it (if not - where have you been?) Of course The Toasters' 2 tracks on it have to be the best - 'Matt Davis' and 'Shocker', But also standing out are Too True's 'Free South Africa'. The Boilers' 'Brighter Days'. and Second Step's 'Opportunity'. This is a must for all ska fans, so if you don't already have it - Get it!

BIMSKALABIM..... BOSTON BLUE BEAT (SKA RECORDS)

The British debut for one of the best Yank revival bands to date. 'Jah Laundermat'. 'Solitary Confinement' and 'Silence' are all excellent songs, But the one that stands out most for me is 'The Key'. This one really is excellent. The LP can be a bit boring in places, due to the fact that they have a little dabble with reggae. But this should not put anyone off buying it. 'Cos it is made up for by the other 99% of material. Don't miss

REGGAE FOR SKINS Vol2. (BATW HOT SHOT TAPES)

Another fanzine editor with a bigger (and better) record collection than me. I've only managed to hear volume 2 of this series (as yet), but that was enough to let me know how good they are. They cost £2.50 each and include such great names as Derrick Morgan, Prince Buster, Laurel Aitken. The Wailers etc. etc. etc ... Get your copies from Dudley at the BATW address.

THESE SOUNDS LEAD THE WAY, SKA WARS, THE BOSS SOUND. (MASS DEMONSTRATION TAPES)

Yet another better record collection than my own appears. This time it's Grogger of Charge sheet fame. This is just the first three in the series and every one's a cracker. With names like The Cats, The Folk Brothers, The Skatalites etc. Again they cost £2.50 each. which is really good value when you think of how many songs you can fit onto a 090 tape. Get yours from the Chargesheet address.

PREVIEW EXTRA *

Just a quick preview of a couple of Roddy's future plans. LPs by The Boilers and Second Step. Both can be heard on Skaville USA so listen to it and you'll know just how good both bands are. The tracks I've heard are 'Chubby' and 'Gangibus Gorrilla' by the Boilers, And 'Tell Me (What's Going On)' and 'Hanging on To Dreams' by second Step. The best of these has to be The Boilers' version of Prince Ruster's Chubby, which is just excellent. But the other tracks are also very good. So watch out for 'em.

LISTEN TO THIS

*THE TOASTERS.....POOL SHARK (UNICORN)

The Toasters debut LP. Although it's aimed mainly at the mod market, (Unicorn is run by Mark Johnson of Phoenix fame) it's by no means solely mod music, quite the opposite in fact. It's billed for 11 cuts, but I only have a tape from Bucket (what' & name dropper I am) with 8 tracks on it. But if the rest of the songs are anywhere near as good as these ones them we have nothing to worry about. It's difficult to pick out high points since all the songs are so dammed good, but I'll do me best. My personal fave has to be Renee, followed closely by Now Or Never and Weekend In LA. Buy this LP and support the creme de la creme of todays ska bands.

PRINCE BUSTER... FABULOUS GREATEST HITS (SPARTAN)

This is the first LP for Spartan to reissue, although it's not really a reissue as such. As far as I know fabulous greatest hits has always been available. All Spartan have done is to repackage it. It doesn't seem a very good choice as their first 'cos their aren't too many classic cuts on it. Although one of my faves Julie is there. It is a good LP, not a greatest hits I don't think, but good none the less.

TROJAN EXPLOSION.......VARIOUS (TROJAN)

It's now just about the 10th anniversary of Trojan releasing their famed Trojan Explosion 7" series. So, to mark the occasion, they've come up with an explosion LP "Combining some of the very best tracks from the explosion series together with choice cuts from deep in the Trojan vaults." Although this is quite a good LP, I think it's about time Trojan started releasing some of their rarer cuts. Songs like Des Dekker's You Can Get It, Harry J's Liquidator, Let Your Yeah Be Yeah etc.. etc... have appeared on more Reggae/Ska compilations than I had thought possible! If you are a Trojan fan then I don't think there's going to be anything new on here for you, but if you haven't got much Trojan then Skinhead classics like Elizabethan serenade and Double Barrel etc should keep you happy.

RINGO.....THE TROJANS (GAZ'S ROCKIN')

Another debut, this time from young Caz's very own band. The A side is spoiled (in my personal oppinion) by the chinese lyrics. It's a very catchy tune though, so all is not lost. The B side Good Friends is thankfully in English. Another good, catchy danceable song. Both songs have a real Potato 5 feel to them, probably due to Caz's involvement. This record is well worth buying. If you have any trouble getting hold of the single the address for Caz's Rockin' Records (and any others mentioned in this issue) can be found elsewhere in the zine.

LIVE'N'LOUD....BAD MANNERS (LINK)

At last Mark Brennan has finally realised that Oi; just ain't where it's at and brought us some ska. This is the first time Bad Manners have had a live LP to themselves. So It's not before time that this has come out. All the old classics are here, so any Bad Manners fans had better get out and get this one. Songs like Ivor the Engine, Lip Up Fatty (McGinn's theme), Inner London Violence, Special Brew, Lorraine etc.... etc.... just cannot be missed.

"Rock me baby'(featuring a classic blues guitar solo by Steve Cropper). It's true to say that there are no bad tracks on the LP Other albums out during this period included the Soul album' and 'Dictionary of soul' and both have more than their fair share of great tracks.

During his career Otis was probably most popular in Europe, particularly Britain, than in America. He toured regularly between 1964 and 1967, and headed the 1965 Stax-Volt tour of Europe. As well as making trips to the UK with his own band. As a live performer he was a classic soul singer with an excellent stage act, dancing, running on the spot and ripping off items of clothing, never giving less than total energy and commitment.

In 1967 two things happened to bring him the widest recognition. First was the Monterey Pop Festival. He was the only soul act to appear alongside rock bands like The Who and Jimi Hendrix.

Surprisingly, he went down really well the second, sadly, was his death on December 10th. On the way to a gig his private plane crashed into a lake near Machison. Some members of the Bar-Kays were also killed in the tragic accident.

Stax released 'Dock of the Bay' in early '68 which No's 1 and 2 in the U.S. and U.K. respectively It was more pop styled than any of his other songs, so this may be an indication of the direction he may have taken had he lived.



Since the Toasters British debut on Roddy Moreno's Ska-Ville USA album they have become one of the biggest names in today's ska scene. Led by Rob 'Bucket' Hingley they have become THE name in American ska and are on target to overtake even Potato 5 over here. Bucket is the only member of the band who isn't a Yank, born and bred an Englander. He started life in a London based Reggae band called 'Eye Witness'. He'd been putting together some ska material for said band when he was sent to the U.S. by the people he was working for in London. So, when it turned out he was going to be there for a while he got together with a few mates and the Toasters were born. Since then they've turned into a 10 piece (sometimes more) band. Personnel as follows:-BUCKET Guitar, Vocals, STEVE HEX Keyboards, GARY EYE Percussion. BRIAN 'TAILS' EMRICH Bass. JOHN McCAIN Drums. SEAN 'CAVO' CAVANAUGH Moves & Vocals. LIONEL BERNARD Moves & Haitispeak (Don't ask me - Ed). MARCEL REGINATO ... Alto Sax, GREC GRINNEL ... Trumpet, JOHN DUGAN ... Tenor Sax. I asked Bucket (on one of my many trips to the States!) why there was a great ska revival going on over there just now. "I can see no earthly reason why there are so many aka bands in the USA right now" he said. He tells me that The Toasters have been going for over 4 years now, and all of a sudden aka bands are crawling out of the NYC woodwork. LA (Untouchables land) is different because of the big Mod/Scooterist thing that I'm sure you all know about. Having heard this I thought there would have to be a specific following for a ska band in NYC, but not so. "All kinds of different people listen to our music. There are a lot of pork pies and a lot of mods . although I'm sure you'll be sorry to find that there aren't all THAT many ska skins over here" Well I've heard this before, but it still makes me sad. But Rob went on to tell me that the skins that do turn up at Toasters gigs are really cool, which is good news. So how do the NY skins compare with our home grown lot? "Most of the NY skins are of the punk/hard core mentality. As such they compare unfavourably with the more educated Uk skinhead, as they more resemble the head banging National Front style skin. And don't seem to have any general philosophy other than hanging round breaking things and being stupid". Sounds like yer typical NF skin to me. It seems a real shame that a city with such a good lot of ska bands should be plagued by this lot. But The Toasters have managed to encourage more skins along to their gigs in order to appreciate the music instead of just trying to "Pick fights and be annoying". Young Bucket was a skinhead himself once, so I guess he knows what he's talking about. I asked him, if The Toasters aren't part of this ska revival, why had they decided to play ska? "Because we like it" was his simple answer. Fair enough! So, what about influences? "Greatest influences are always difficult because there's always so many"

he told me. But he went on to give me some of the major ones, "Prince Buster, simply because he is the king", Jimmy Cliff was mentioned too "Because he had so many great cuts. Particular favourites have got to be "Johnny too Bad' and 'The Harder They Fall'". Dave and Ansill Collins were there and even The Beatles, of course The Specials and Selecter "Because they brought ska back with a real twist" and last but not least Joe Jackson, who has done production work for The Toasters, "Because he taught me not to quit".

Anyway, I think that's all the questions answered. So what's on for The Toasters now? (That's another question stupid - Ed) Well they already have tracks on 2 Unicorn mod compilations, and their 'Fool Shark' LF on the same label. Plus Roddy has shown an interest and should be releasing a mini album and single some time in the not too distant future. They've also just signed a deal with Celluloid Records, who are a major American indie, and will be billed as the first American ska band to get a major deal. Good news methinks. They've also been talking of touring Britain in August, which seems highly unlikely now. But watch out for them in the future, or you really will be missing out.

So far this year 6 scooter rallies have passed. These being Morecambe, Yammouth, IoW, Cirvan, Rhyl and Margate. Ihave attended 4 so far, missing only Margate (due to work commitments) and IoW (due to my scooter being damaged by a Rover 3500 coming at me up the wrong side of the road.)

We'll start at the beginning shall we. Morecambe Bay, a run that's been going for many a moon and is notorious for hassle from the police and council. 

SCOOTER SKINS

In the early '60s an amazing mode of transport became very popular, the scooter. Scooters were not exactly a new thing, they had been made as early as the '40s (I think!). But in the '60s there was what was called the scooter boom. At first I suppose it would have just been used by the general public as a cheap and convenient mode of transport. But around the same time a new youth cult appeared on the scene- mods. Mods addopted scooters, not only as a form of transport, but as part of their style. Scooters were decorated with as many accessories as could be fitted to them. The mods used their scooters to reach seaside resorts where they would fight with their sworn enemies— the greasers, who also had their own form of transport— motor bikes.

Since skinhead was a natural progression from mod it would seem only natural that the scooters would be kept. Skinheads did ride scooters. Though, unlike the mods it was not a part of their style. Skins wouldn't have gone to the extremes of the mods with decorations (although, having said that, there must have been some skinheads who had their scooters covered in mirrors.) The skins would just keep the scooters the way they were or cut them do wn to the bare essentials.

When skinhead died out during the '70s the scooter scene was kept alive by the north of the Watford Gap baggy trousered brigade. Soul boys were also a sort of progression from modernism, since they had the same musical tastes-Tamla Motown and '60s soul, along with the American soul of the day, soon to become known as Northern soul. Soul boys used their scooters to get them to and from the many all niters they frequented and for weekend runs around the country Not long after the demise of the Northern Soul all niters scooter runs began growing from weekend runs with yer mates to bank holiday scooter rallies with scooterists from all over the country in attendance. Although at first these rallies were-mainly soul boy/mod orientated a small handful of skins could be seen. Since then the number of skins at the rallies has been steadily increasing and now they are a common sight alongside the scooter yobs. But of course the small minority of skinheads have mucked everything up as usual. The NF bone eads have decided to. go to the runs and spoil them for everyone. Now a lot of skins have taken to dressing in scooterist clobber so as not to be associated with the NF. Now it seems that much stricter rules will be brought in regarding scooter rallies which will make them 2 lot less enjoyable for all scooterists. But any skins out there with an interest in scooters- don't be put off, go to the runs and don't give in to the wankers. See ya there!





Let's see.... what good things have come from skinheads in the last 20 years or so?- Ben Shermans, Red Tags, Loafers, Brogues, Boots, Ska, Rocksteady, Football Aggro and a whole host of other things too numerous to mention. Now let's try and think of the bad things that've come from skinheads - the NF, Bone'eads, Glue aniffin' and Garry Bushell! So what do you think has brought all these nasties to our scene? Oi has encouraged all the wrong people to our scene. Take alook at the pictures hereabout and ask yourself if these are really the kind of people we want to be associated with. Instead of dressing smartly as skins should, the 'new breed' are quite happy to be associated with punks (to use a much used cliche - Punks should be considered modern day grease). What else apart from Oi could have brought this about?

Not only has 0i brought punks to our scene, it has also played its part in encouraging skins to be nazis, and vice versa. When was the last time you heard of a right wing ska band!? Don't get me wrong - I'm not trying to imply that 0i is racist music in any vay. But there are lots of racist 0i bands popping up, and most 0i bands have their racist following. In the early days of (real) 0i very few bands had sympathies with the right, even Skrewdrivel weren't racist in the beginning.

Oi has now led to some skinhead bands belting out thrash metal. And rumour has it that the London Oi boys even listen to greaser shit like Iron Maiden etc... If this is what Oi is bringing to our scene then I'd rather have nothing to do with it.

Don't get me wrong, I'm not trying to put anyone done just because they listen to Oi, I

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Laurel Aitken

Laurel Aitken was born in Cuba in April 1927, moving to Jamaica in 1956. After only 2 years in Jamaica he won an 'Opportunity Knocks' competition sponsored by Vere Johns. During the 1950s Laurel sang with all the big names in Jamaica and eventually got involved in the growing ska scene over there. Quickly scoring a hit with 'Little Shiela /'Boogie In My Bones' in 1960.

All through the '60s he was well known for his involvement in Ska/skinhead reggae, and has recently got back into the limelight by gigging and recording with The Potato 5. So what has he been doing all these years? "Since my last hit which was Rudy got married in 1980, I have been doing gigs all over England, and also producing." Laurel has also been involved with bands in his addopted hometown of Liecester 'Oneness' and 'Cabana'. He also sat in on early sessions with the Beat and sang on some of their early records.

Laurel has been known and loved by generations of skins now, what does he think of them and does he like to see us at his gigs? "I don't like to see skinheads at my gigs - I LOVE to see them there," Now that is good news. "A lot of skins come to my gigs and I have a lot of personal friends among them," he goes on to tell me which I'm glad to hear.

But we all know that there are a lot of NF skins in London, and after the trouble at the Des Dekker do in Yarmouth last year we know that they're out to cause trouble. Are there no trouble makers turning up at Laurels gigs? "All the skinheads that come to my gigs are the same as they were in the '60s, they just come for a good time, they don't cause any trouble, they just want to enjoy themselves." The news gets better all the time. Don't tell me the Oi Boy lot have finally realised they don't matter and crawled back into their holes.

Anyway, enough of this crap and back to the music. Since most of us last heard of Laurel at the height of the 2 Tone led ska revival he has recorded a number of new songs, including 'Come Down To The Party', 'Big Fat Man', 'Stolen Car' and, of course, his latest offerings backed by the Spuds. But who would his band be when not accompanied by The Potato 5? "I have my own band who are just called the Laurel Aitken Rand and they consist of drums, bass, keyboards, guitar, trumpet and sax." 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
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


